In Wisconsin, four Planned Parenthood locations are closing beginning in April (Beaver Dam, Johnson Creek, Chippewa Falls and Shawano). In Iowa, two of Planned Parenthood's 21 locations (in Spencer and Fort Madison) will close effective March 15. According to its latest annual report, Planned Parenthood Federation of America (PPFA) performed a record number of abortions in the 2011-2012 fiscal year: 333,964 abortions (compared with 329,445 abortions in 2010-2011). 45.2 percent of the total PPFA budget came from taxpayer dollars in the form of government funding. The 1500th abortion clinic in the U.S. has closed, leaving a total of 660 facilities nationwide. This year marks a 70 percent decrease in the number of clinics in existence since 1991. (Source: Life News. com, 1/22; CLR Life News, 1/24)

Seventy-seven Oregonians died in 2012 after obtaining lethal medication to end their lives—a 21 perecent increase in the number of prescriptions for assisted suicide in Oregon since **2009.** Only two of these 77 patients who killed themselves with lethal drugs was referred for a formal psychiatric or psychological evaluation. Speaking Up For Life



"Down syndrome is a genetic condition that causes delays in physical and intellectual development. It occurs in one in every 691 live births. Individuals with Down syndrome have 47 chromosomes instead of the usual 46. It is the most frequently occurring chromosomal disorder. Down syndrome is not related to race, nationality, religion, or socioeconomic status.
